GABRIEL NELSON.

HAYWARD—Gabriel Nelson, ploneer of Hayward, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Henry Ramsted on Friday, April 3, from juffirmitles of old age. He was born in Norway December 31, 1839, and was married to Ollanna Johnson Ness in 1871. In 1831 he came to America with his family, settling in Politedunty where he remained until 1856, when he came to Hayward which was then a wilderness of virgin pine.

A carpenter by trade, Mr. Nelson helped erect most of the early buildings. He was a charter member of the Norwegian Lutheran church and was instrumental in establishing the first Lutheran Sunday school in this section of the state, and until his advanced age prevented he was active in the work of the Lutheran congregation.

Funeral services were held from the Norwegian Lutheran church, conducted jointly by the Rev. C. M. Paulson of Hayward and the Rev. E. J. Nord of Rice Lake. Pallbearers were his grandsons, Alfred and Norman Olson, Gustof and Adolph Haugseth, Harry Ramsted, and Carl Glibortson. Interment took place at Greenwood cemetery.
